Meeting the Music

Why Program It?

First meeting them

- Other performances
 - Concert
 - Recordings
 - Streaming
 - Radio
- Suggestions
 - From singers
 - From audience
 - From composers
- Personal experience
 - During training / youth
 - Research
 - Conference

- Personal assessment
 - You've fallen in love with it
 - You like it
 - You admire / appreciate it
- For the choir
 - They'll enjoy it
 - They'll sound good
 - Good for their training
 - Good fit for a specific program
- Other
 - The audience will like it
 - Requested
 - Historically noteworthy



Crafting a Program

Getting to know them

Musical considerations

- Is it long enough for a whole concert?
- Is it long enough for half a concert?
 - Find a partner piece
 - Or compile another half of shorter works
 - Does it open, close, ... or go in the middle?
- How long can the choir / audience withstand?
 - Community choir: 50–65 minutes of music
- Variables in compiling shorter works
 - Musical contrast / consistency
 - Thematic unity (usually text)
 - Concert order

Practical considerations

- Difficulty learning
 - Difficulty in vocal production
 - Available rehearsal time
 - *Total* difficulty level, for voices / ears
- Budget for instruments, soloists, scores



Pitching to the Board

Asking friends for advice about dating them

The Board

- Governing body
 - Legal responsibility for organization
 - Regular meetings (monthly, or quarterly)
 - Conductor is *ex officio* (non-voting)
- Principal responsibilities
 - Development (Fund-raising, marketing, outreach)
 - Management (Budgeting, logistics, hiring)
 - Stewardship (Financial and legal oversight)



Planning Each Rehearsal

Preparing for each date

Warm-ups (10–15 minutes, or more)

- (1) Posture
- (2) Breathing
- (3) Sing low
- (4) Sing high(-ish)
- (5) Special elements, like tuning, vowels, resonance, dynamics, phrasing

First pieces

• Blend technique into the repertoire

Teaching the music (methods vary wildly)

- For teaching pitches, I like to find two parts that complement each other (SA/TB, or SB/AT, or ST/AB), especially rhythmically
- Rhythm. Clapping, counting
- Diction. International Phonetic Alphabet, or English approximants
- Vocal technique



Planning Rehearsal Arc

Deepening the relationship

THE GOAL

• Gradually less about musicianship, more about musicality

First 1–2 rehearsals

• Sight-read through everything

Continue rehearsals

- Teach pitches, rhythms, dynamics, vowels, etc.
- Take notes on what was accomplished each week

Halfway to two-thirds

• Re-assess (run-through rehearsal)

Approaching the concert

• Be concert-ready 1–2 weeks early



As the Concert Approaches

Concert logistics

- Venue-specific variables
 - Scheduling
 - Standing order
 - Staging
 - Setting up
- Audience interactions
 - Writing program notes
 - Pre-concert lecture
 - Mid-concert remarks
- Recommending standards
 - Concert dress
 - Concert etiquette
 - Attendance requirements

Meanwhile...

- For next concert
 - Studying scores
 - Hiring instrumentalists / soloists
 - Recruiting / auditioning singers
- For next season
 - Planning repertoire
 - Budgeting
 - Marketing
- Professional development
 - Conferences, networking
 - Reading, research
 - Other activities freelancing, teaching, composing, writing, lecturing, etc.



Concert Week

Happily ever after...?

Shift in focus

- Final rehearsals
 - Setting up (esp. orchestral chairs)
 - Rehearsals focus more on run-through
 - Very little repetition of any given section

• Concert

- In rehearsals, listening with half-mind on correction
- In concerts, conducting the angels

The future?

- Sometimes relationship ends (usually amicably)
- Sometimes conductor & music return to each other forever



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What does a conductor really do?

- Music Selecting, programming, planning, studying
- Teaching Training, rehearsing, auditioning
- Organization Fund-raising, logistics, management, meetings
- Professional development Other musical activities
