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Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Biography – (1) Early Works (i)

- Youth, family.
- Education.
 - 1890, RCM with Parry.
 - 1892, Cambridge with Wood.
 - 1895, RCM with Stanford.
 - 1897, Max Bruch in Berlin.
- Beginning a career.
 - 1902, Linden Lea. First published work.
 - 1903, begins collecting folk songs.
 - 1906, The English Hymnal.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Biography – (1) Early Works (ii)

- Important premieres.
 - 1907, Toward the Unknown Region (Whitman), Leeds Festival.
 - 1907–08, studies with Ravel in Paris.
 - 1909, The Wasps for Cambridge.
 - 1910, Fantasia on a Theme of Thomas Tallis, Three Choirs (Gloucester).
 - 1910, A Sea Symphony (Whitman), Leeds Festival.
 - 1910, Fantasia on Christmas Carols. Folksongs bearing fruit.
 - 1913, Shakespeare scores for Stratford.
 - 1914, A London Symphony.
- 1914–19. The Great War.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Biography – (2) Between the Wars (i)

• Employment.

- Teaching. 1919, professor of composition at RCM.
- Conducting. 1921–8, conductor of Bach Choir.
- Editing. 1925, Songs of Praise 1928, Oxford Book of Carols.
- Lecturing. 1932, Bryn Mawr in Philadelphia (later Cornell).
- Collecting thoughts after the Great War.
 - 1921, The Lark Ascending, for violin and orchestra.
 - 1922, A Pastoral Symphony, based on war experience.
 - 1922, Mass in G minor, based on Tudor music.
 - 1924, Hugh the Drover, folksong opera, begun before the war.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Biography – (2) Between the Wars (ii)

- The leader of British classical music.
 - 1926, Sancta Civitas, Biblical oratorio.
 - 1929, Sir John in Love, Shakespeare opera.
 - 1930, *Job* at Norwich.
 - 1935, Symphony 4.
 - 1936, Five Tudor Portraits and Dona Nobis Pacem.
 - 1937, Riders to the Sea, one-act opera.
- Other events.
 - 1931, first St Matthew Passion at Leith Hill Festival.
 - 1932, President of English Folk Dance and Song Society.
 - 1937, coronation of King George VI.
 - 1938, meets Ursula Wood.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Biography – (3) Late Works

- 1939–45. The Second World War.
 - 1940, 49th Parallel, first film score.
 - 1943, Symphony 5, based on The Pilgrim's Progress.
- New sonorities, new approaches.
 - 1948, Symphony 6.
 - 1948, Scott of the Antarctic, film score. 1953, Sinfonia Antartica.
 - 1951, The Pilgrim's Progress, opera at Covent Garden.
 - 1953, coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.
 - 1954, Tuba Concerto.
 - 1954, *Hodie*, major Christmas work.
 - 1956, Symphony 8.
 - 1958, Symphony 9.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Works for Chamber Choir

- Three categories.
 - Music for the church.
 - Music based on folksongs.
 - Music with literary texts.
- Each category represented in each period.
- Omissions.
 - Arrangements.
 - Excerpts.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir

Early Works, 1900–1914

- Literary.
 - 1902, Rest (Rossetti), same year as Linden Lea publication.
 - 1905, Darest thou now, O Soul (Whitman), his first Whitman.
 - 1913, Love is a sickness, madrigal.
- Church.
 - 1906, The English Hymnal: 4 original tunes, 65 harmonizations.
 - Including Sine Nomine and Salve festa dies.
 - 1911, Five Mystical Songs (Herbert).
- Folksongs.
 - 1906, Down among the dead men, for TB, for Pilgrim's Progress.
 - 1914, Five English Folk Songs.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Between the Wars, 1920–39 (i)

- Folksongs.
 - 1919–20, carols in simple arrangements.
 - 1919, The turtle dove, TB (SATB, 1924).
 - 1921, Loch Lomond, TB (SATB, 1931).
 - 1934, another flurry: Six English Folk Songs, TB.
 - Also John Dory.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Between the Wars, 1920–39 (ii)

• Church.

- 1920, O clap your hands, with organ and/or brass.
- 1921, Lord, thou hast been our refuge.
- 1922, Mass in G minor, for Westminster Cathedral.
- 1922, O vos omnes.
- 1925, Magnificat and Nunc dimittis ('Village Service'), simple, also unison.
- 1925, Songs of Praise, more hymn tunes and harmonizations.
- 1928, *Te Deum* in G. Also *The Oxford Book of Carols*.
- 1930, Three Choral Hymns, for Leith Hill Festival.
- 1937, Festival Te Deum in F, for coronation of George VI.
- 1939, complete Services in D minor.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Between the Wars, 1920–39 (iii)

- Literary.
 - Very little between the wars.
 - Nothing is here for tears (Milton), unison, for death of George V.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Late Works, 1940–1958 (i)

- Literary.
 - 1940, Six Choral Songs (To Be Sung in Time of War) (Shelley), unison.
 - 1942, Valiant-for-truth (Bunyan), from The Pilgrim's Progress.
 - 1943, The New Commonwealth (Harold Child), again Pilgrim's Progress.
 - 1951, Sun, Moon, Stars, and Man (Ursula Wood).
 - 1951, Three Shakespeare Songs.
 - 1953, Silence and Music (Ursula Wood), coronation madrigal.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872–1958) and the Chamber Choir Late Works, 1940–1958 (ii)

- Folksongs.
 - 1942, Nine Carols, for TB, simple.
 - 1950, Folk Songs of the Four Seasons, treble.
- Church.
 - 1947, The Souls of the Righteous and The Voice out of the Whirlwind.
 - 1948, Prayer to the Father of Heaven (Skelton).
 - 1953, coronation of Elizabeth II.
 - O taste and see and The Old Hundredth Psalm Tune.
 - 1954, Hodie, many excerpts (i.e., 'The blessed son of God').
 - 1956, A Vision of Aeroplanes
